- Demonstrate evidence-based practices
- Show clear connections between activities and outcomes

3

Measurable Impact

- Define specific, quantifiable outcomes
- Establish realistic timelines
- Present your evaluation methodology

4

Budget Clarity

- Present detailed, justified costs
- Show efficient use of resources
- Demonstrate financial sustainability

5

Organizational Capacity

- Highlight your track record
- Showcase key staff qualifications
- Present strong partnerships and community support

Generic Proposals: Not tailoring applications to specific funders

Weak Data: Lacking concrete evidence to support your case

Budget Misalignment: Numbers that don't match your narrative

Vague Outcomes: Failing to specify measurable impacts

Poor Organization: Unclear or hard-to-follow proposals
